

At 10:30 Irene Griffey will speak informally to the group for thirty minutes on land records. We are really trying to serve you, so do let us know what needs you have.

Shirley Wilson continues to serve on the board in an advisory capacity, for which we are grateful since we need the benefit of her expertise.

Samford University's Institute of Genealogy and Historical Research celebrated its twenty-fifth year this last month with a record number in attendance. I was lucky to attend the classes taught by Lloyd Bockstruck, head of the Genealogy Department of the Dallas Public Library, who in addition to his vast knowledge has a terrific sense of humor.

Learning is so stimulating. It can occur in classes or on an individual basis. For the forthcoming year I hope we can all learn together and share those items which will be mutually beneficial.

We hope you will plan to be with your friends and fellow genealogists for most of the day on Saturday August 19. The Help Sessions are open to all members who desire to get one-on-one assistance from others in the field. We think you will like the emphasis on deeds in Irene Griffey's discussion. Also in the afternoon we know you will be fascinated by Sharon MacPherson's examples of old documents. Some may be from the Andrew Jackson Papers which she has co-edited.

Who among us has not suffered extreme anxiety and frustration when trying to decipher early handwriting, vocabulary, punctuation, grammar, spelling, and syntax? Experts at paleography are wonderful people to know, for such knowledge can often spell the difference between correct and incorrect interpretation of that will, deed, or census record that is puzzling us.

We are fortunate to have an expert in the interpretation of old documents here in Nashville. Sharon McPherson, Curator of Research at The Hermitage, will be our speaker at the August meeting. From 1976 until 1988, she has served as Associate Editor of the Andrew Jackson Papers. Sharon took her graduate-level work at the University of Wisconsin at Madison, in American Civilization. In addition to teaching history and government at the college level, Sharon has been an instructor for the last three years at the National Historical Publications and Records Commission, a two week institute in Madison, Wisconsin. Locally, she has taught a course, "The Editing of Historical Documents," at Tennessee State University. Her publications, in addition to the two-volume Andrew Jackson Papers, include Guide to the Manuscripts of the Wisconsin Historical Society.

Sharon is a very knowledgeable and interesting speaker. Don't miss this program!

REPORT ON THE TENNESSEE GENEALOGY AND FAMILY HISTORY CONFERENCE

Those of you who attended the June 10 conference are no doubt already aware of the tremendous reception which the Middle Tennessee community accorded this workshop. Two hundred seventy-one attendees heard sessions which included the keynote speaker, Johni Cerny, a prolific genealogical writer and publisher; hands-on instruction in the use of local LDS family history centers; and a description of the McClung collection in Knox County as well as of sources available for genealogical research in Shelby County. Our own fearless leader, Mary Glenn Hearne, spoke on the collections of the Nashville Room. The Tennessee State Library and Archives contributed the services of Archivist Ann Alley, who spoke on Cherokee research, and Archivist Marilyn Bell Hughes, who spoke on land records and sources available at TSLA. Fisk Librarian Jessie Carney Smith presented a session on black genealogical research. And a tour of TSLA was an especially well-received bonus which followed the workshop itself.

Evaluation responses from attendees gave valuable insight on topics in which our membership has interest, and as Vice President (Program Chairman), I paid special attention to your suggestions. Among the topics which you can expect to see this year in our programs for 1989-1990 include: how to publish your manuscript, migration patterns to and from Tennessee, tips on the organization of your materials, and the preservation of old documents and photographs.

**MICROFILMS OF WPA COPIES OF COUNTY RECORDS
IN TENNESSEE STATE LIBRARY & ARCHIVES
(Now Available on Interlibrary Loan)**

Perhaps the most used records in the Tennessee State Library and Archives are what is popularly called "the WPA books." As a "make work" project for the unemployed, the Tennessee Historical Records Survey was established in 1936. The Tennessee State Library and Archives assumed control of the project in 1939.

One of the purposes of the Work Progress Administration was to preserve information by transcribing selected county records. Four copies of the typed transcriptions were made. The original copy was placed in the Tennessee State Library and Archives. Carbon copies were furnished Chattanooga Public Library; Knoxville, Knox County Public Library; and the University of Tennessee at Knoxville. (Loretta L. Hefner, *The WPA Historical Records Survey* (Chicago: The Soc. of American Archivists, 1980).

The WPA records are now microfilmed and available on interlibrary loan from the Tennessee State Library and Archives. **BUT THEY MUST BE ORDERED THROUGH YOUR LIBRARY.** When ordering, ask your library to specify the 16 mm roll number desired from Record Group 107 (WPA copies of county material).

Following is an inventory of these records for the Middle Tennessee Counties. This inventory was copied from the Register for Record Group 107 in the Tennessee State Library and Archives. Additional information furnished is the date each county was formed and the parent county plus the applicable microfilm reel number for that county.

REVOLUTIONARY PENSION APPLICATIONS

JOHN HALL PENSION CLAIM #S2259

On 6 October 1835 in Williamson County, TN, John Hall, aged 87, appeared in open court before Nicholas Perkins, John Hughes, Elijah R. Parish, Justices of the Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions and made the following declaration to receive benefit of provisions of the Act of Congress passed June 7, 1832:

"I was born in the year 1748 in King and Queen County, Virginia. I was first drafted into Capt. William Drumrights' company in the county of Mecklenburg, Virginia, in the year 1778 as near as I can recollect. The object of my being called out was to guard the magazene on Roanoke River Taylors Ferry. This tour consisted of 3 months during which time we guarded said magazene under said Capt. I got a discharge by the captain at the end of the tour, which is now lost.

I was next drafted into Capt. Reuben Vaughan's company for six months while living in the same County Mecklenburg. This was in the year that Charleston was invaded 1780 as well as I recollect and the object was to aid S. Carolina in the defence of Charleston. We were marched to Granville Courthouse North Carolina ... here we entered the regiment commanded by Col. Lee Burrell and under General David Mason. We marched for Charleston and on our march at a town by the name of Charlotte some distance from Charleston we halted a small portion of the company I was in, in consequence of sickness while the main army advanced. Here I remained until my six months tour was expired when Col. Polk a citizen of Charlotte who had been deputized to discharge us when our time was out gave me a written discharge which I lost sometime after the war. I then returned home and served no more, except on small excursions ... My first tour of 3 months and last of 6 months making 9 months service I claim pension for. I have no documentary evidence of my service. I know of no person living by whom I can prove my service. I know no officer under whom I served except those above mentioned. I do not recollect the number of the regiment my company was attached to in my last tour. I have no record of my age which was registered in the parish of King and Queen County where I was born and lived till about 17 years of age. My father moved with his family to Mecklenburg County Virginia. Here I lived until 1817 when I moved to Tennessee Rutherford County. After living in Rutherford about 2 years I moved to Williamson County, Tennessee, where I now live and have been living ever since. I can state John R. Perry and Thos. Pennington and John Gant who are acquainted with me and my character for (can't decipher) and a revolutionary soldier besides John Landrum the clergyman and Thomas Tanner and Jesse Bugg who certify for me. I would state that last August 2 years ago, I came to town with a view to have my claim prosecuted but owing to the crowded business of court and my infirmity, I was disappointed and now am induced to apply for some late pecuniary loss and my belief of the (can't decipher) of my claim. I hereby relinquish every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declare my name is not on the pension roll of any agency in any state."

Sworn to in open court 6 Oct. 1835. /s/ John Hall /s/ Thos. Hardeman, Clk.

John Landrum a clergyman, Jesse Bugg and Thomas Tanner all residing in Williamson County, Tennessee, declare they believe John Hall to be 78 years of age and that he is reported in the neighborhood where he resides to have been a soldier of the revolution.

Note on the jacket shows that John Hall of Washington County, Tennessee, was a private in the company commanded by Captain Drumright of the regt. commanded by Col. Burrell in the N. Carolina line for six months. (Va. Line Records corrected.) Inscribed on the Roll of West Tennessee at the rate of 20 Dollars per annum to commence on the 4th day of March 1831. No. 30,295 West Tennessee.

Receipt signed by John Landrum, Administrator, shows that John Hall, Dec'd was paid under the act of 7 June 1832 from the 4 day of March 1852 (the time to which he was last paid) to the 28 day of December 1852 the day of his death.

John Woods, Clerk of Rutherford County, Tennessee swore that John Hall died in Rutherford County, Tennessee, on 28th day of December 1852. He left no widow but the following named and only surviving children viz: William Hall, Elizabeth Pennington, Amos Hall and Delphia Landrum. John Landrum the Administrator of John Hall duly qualified according to law. Dated 7 March 1853.

BENJAMIN RAGSDALE PENSION CLAIM W.1079

Benjamin Ragsdale was born in 1759 on Cape Fear River in Chatham County, North Carolina. The names of his parents are not shown in the papers in the pension claim.

While residing in Chatham County, North Carolina, Benjamin Ragsdale enlisted in June 1780 and served three months as a private in Captain Dillard's North Carolina Company. Sometime afterwards, he enlisted and served fifteen days as a private in Captain Hawkins Dye's Company, Colonel Austin's North Carolina "horse troop". He enlisted in 1781 and served three months as a private in Captain Yarbry's Company, Colonel Davidson's North Carolina Regiment.

After the Revolution, he resided in Moore County (state not given) for ten or twelve years and about 1801 moved to the state of Tennessee. He was allowed pension on his application executed September 4, 1832, while residing in Williamson County, Tennessee.

He died in Williamson County, March 20, 1843, according to the statement of his widow. However, there is a statement on file in the claim that his death occurred on August 9, 1842, and that his pension was paid up to the time of his death.

Benjamin Ragsdale, Certificate No. 19033, issued July 26, 1833, rate \$21.60 per annum commenced March 4, 1843, Act of June 7, 1832, West Tennessee Agency. He married in September 1778 in Moore County, North Carolina to Martha or Patsey (maiden name not given). His widow was allowed a pension on her application executed August 8, 1843, at which time she was a resident of Williamson County, Tennessee, and was aged eighty-one years.

The names of the following children are shown but the dates of their birth are not given:

Mary Ragsdale, William Ragsdale, Daniel Ragsdale, Dempsey Ragsdale, Lancaster Ragsdale, Kesiah or Kissiah Ragsdale, Dicey Ragsdale, Sarah Ragsdale, John Ragsdale, Roda Ragsdale. James Ragsdale was a son-in-law of the soldier but his wife's name is not designated.

In August 1843, James Ragsdale of Williamson County, Tennessee, made affidavit in support of the widow, Martha Ragsdale's claim for pension and then stated that he was fifty one years of age, the 12th day of May last (no relationship to the family was shown). In 1847 Sarah Ragsdale was a resident of Williamson County, Tennessee. She stated she was aged forty eight years of age but did not state any relationship to the family. Lancaster Ragsdale was a resident of Williamson County, Tennessee, in 1832, and the name Richard Ragsdale appears but no relationship to the family is shown.

BAXTER RAGSDALE PENSION CLAIM #S4753


Baxter Ragsdale was born August 24, 1760, in Lunenburg County, Virginia. The names of his parents are not given.

While living in Granville County, North Carolina, he enlisted in May or June 1780, served three months as a private with the North Carolina troops under Captains Peter Bennett and Samuel Jones and Colonel Gaddy and was in the battle of Rocky Mount.

He moved from Granville County, North Carolina, to Lunenburg County, Virginia, where he enlisted in 1781 and served three months as private in Captain M. Mackey's Virginia regiment. He then moved back to Granville County, North Carolina, where he remained until the close of the Revolution when he moved to Franklin County, North Carolina. In 1807 he moved to Bedford County, Tennessee "on the wartrace fork of Duck River".

Baxter Ragsdale was allowed pension on his application executed November 9, 1832, at which time he was living in Bedford County, Tennessee.

There is no data in regard to his family nor the time of his death.

QUESTION: What was the widow's dower and of what value is it in genealogical research?

THE WIDOW'S DOWER

The widow's dower was one third interest in the lands her husband died "seized and possessed of" and usually included the mansion house and outbuildings. After her death, her interest went to her husband's heirs.

Petition for this dower can be found in the county, circuit or chancery courts of the county in which her husband last resided. The court appointed commissioners who surveyed or "laid off" the dower. A plat was presented to the court and can sometimes be found in court minutes or deed books.

The dower was a life estate in the land and proof of descent can be documented when the heirs sold their interest in the dower or sold the dower itself.

LEGISLATIVE PETITION
#76 - 1819

[EDITOR'S NOTE: The Congressional Reservation Line began where the Elk River crossed the southern boundary line of the present state of Tennessee. It ran directly North just East of Pulaski and Columbia until it struck the Duck River. It then followed the Duck River until it struck the Military Reservation Line (which was just about where the Duck River turned North) and then followed the Military Reservation Line West to the Tennessee River, which it followed to the northern border of the state. The people signing this petition would have been in the Southwestern portion of Maury County and that portion of Lewis County formed from Maury County in 1843.]

The petition of sundry of the inhabitants of Maury County to the Honourable the General Assembly of the State of Tennessee, Humbly Sheweth that whereas the Legislature of the State at their session of Eighteen hundred and seven, passed a Law giving a preference to the citizens who had settled on and were in actual possession of any vacant unappropriated land within this State on the twelfth day of September Eighteen hundred and seven, to locate warrants on their improvements. Also the Legislature of Eighteen hundred and nine passed a law giving further indulgence to the aforesaid Citizens, to procure titles for their improvement. And the Legislature of Eighteen hundred and thirteen gave further encouragement to all citizens settled on the vacant land within what is called the Congressional reservation. From the encouragement held forth by the legislature and relying on the good faith of our government, we your petitioners were induced to settle on the vacant land within said bounds, and have remained in possession of the same for a number of years, making said improvements as in many instances to greatly increase the value of said lands and are prepared with warrants to lay on our respective improvements when an office may be open for that purpose. In connexion with the aforesaid observations, your petitioners would observe that they have, at all times, demeaned themselves as faithful subjects to government: have taken arms in defence of the same, the wounds of some of us are scarcely closed, obtained in the late conflict for our families and homes. The weals of the weeping widows scarcely laid aside - the tears of the orphan is not yet dry - for the husband, the parent, that gloriously fell in defence of their families - their homes. If these are deprived of their present hopes and abandoned by their country - their only refuge - the wounds closed will again be torn open - the (torn) of the fatherless may again run - and the widow may again resume her mourning. We your petitioners pray your honorable body would take our grievances into consideration, and pass a law that those who have been in actual possession for themselves, heirs, executors, administrators or assigns of any vacant land, within said Congressional reservation for the term of (blank) years shall produce a good and valid land warrant or warrants and deliver the same to some lawful surveyor appointed by your honorable body for that purpose at such time and place may be directed and cause our improvements to be surveyed within anytime that you in your wisdom may think proper to appoint and authorize your petitioners to obtain titles for their improvements without delay or hinderance or disturbance of any person or persons whatsoever. And your petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray.....



ADAMS & AYERS vs CARR

(Contributed by Betsy Ragsdale)

"TO THE HON. B. S. RIDLEY, Chancellor sitting at Lafayette, Tennessee

...The bill of complaint of Solomon A. Adams & his wife Elmira I., citizens of Macon County, Tennessee and Thomas H. Ayers and his wife Rachel, citizens of Texas, filed against John N. Carr, James D. Carr & Houston Carr, citizens of Macon County, Tennessee.

Respectfully complaining your orators & oratrises would show to your Honor that Madison B. Alexander departed this life intestate in the month of July 1850 leaving as his only children and heirs at law your oratrises Elmira I. & Rachel who were then minors, the Elmira I. having been born the 22d day of November 1834 and the said Rachel on the 13th day of October 1836. They further show that they were neither of them married then and that afterwards on the 12th day of December 1850 your oratrix Elmira I. intermarried with your orator Solomon A. Adams and your oratrix Rachael intermarried with your orator Ayers on the 23 day of August 1855. They would further show that besides good personal property said Madison B. died seized and possessed of a valuable tract of land..."

BOOK REVIEWS

Timothy R. and Helen C. Marsh, compilers. **CHANCERY COURT RECORDS OF BEDFORD COUNTY, TENNESSEE.** Easley, S. C., Southern Historical Press, 1988. 324 pages.

The Marshes are a husband and wife team of genealogical researchers who personally transported several minute books to the Tennessee State Library and Archives for microfilming after it was discovered that they had been overlooked in the original microfilming. With this volume of abstracts all known early Chancery Court Minutes of Bedford County are now published. They are also on microfilm at the TSLA. The following items are included: Chancery Court Minutes, 1830-1848; Chancery Court Minutes 1846-1853; Chancery Court Record Book, 1854-1856-1858 plus some that date to 1865. An unexpected bonus is the twelve page "Summary of Vital Records as Abstracted from this Publication." A surname index to all the abstracts and records expedites the research.

Helen C. and Timothy R. Marsh, compilers. **LAND DEED GENEALOGY OF BEDFORD COUNTY, TENNESSEE, 1807-1852.** Easley, S. C., Southern Historical Press, 1988. 482 pages.

The authors state in their introduction that the land deeds in Bedford County are complete from its formation in 1807 til 1852, the period of time covered in this book of abstracts. Nine deed books destroyed by fire in 1863 were re-recorded by the grantors and grantees immediately after the war. Further information on the land within Bedford County is given in the introduction. The volume has a surname index.

Patricia Gilliam Hastings. **INTO HIS MARVELOUS LIGHT: THE MINUTES OF THE SILOAM MISSIONARY BAPTIST CHURCH, 1841-1883.** Nashville: The Author (4307 Central Pike, Hermitage, TN 37076), 1988. 166 pages.

An attorney by profession, author Pat Hastings has utilized her considerable skills in transcribing these minutes of the Siloam Missionary Baptist Church. Located in Macon County, one of the "burned" counties in Tennessee, the minutes reveal the customs and beliefs of these people. Background information on the county and the church contribute to the publication as does the inclusion of the editorial policy, footnotes and bibliography. A full name index is also included.

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
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
