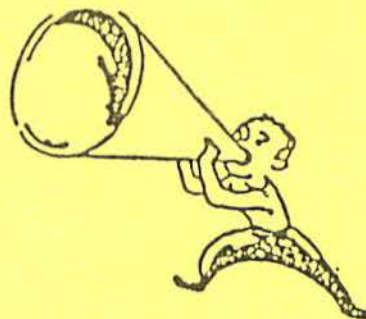

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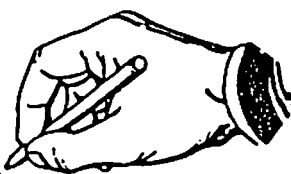

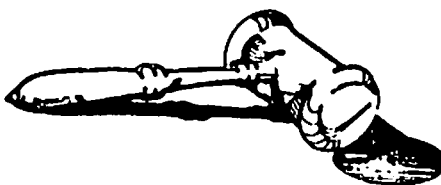
Your Publications Committee met prior to the board meeting and, among other items, is at work on some guidelines for our publication.

Members, have you ever wondered about what recurring symbols carved on tombstones could tell you about the individuals who occupy those cities of the dead? Where and how were their tombstones carved, and what kind of rock did their survivors prefer to commemorate their memory? Were there burial customs that were observed by our forefathers that we no longer observe, or customs that we retain but no longer remember their significance? How can we learn to recognize and interpret cemetery art?

Come to our February 17 meeting to find out! Sheila Riley, Special Projects Director of the Tennessee Historical Society, will speak on Victorian cemetery art at our February 17 meeting of the Society. She will give a historical overview of gravestone art and symbolism, which will particularly focus on stones from the Victorian period. The program will feature a slide presentation to illustrate her talk. Monuments in Mount Olivet and the Nashville City Cemetery will be among the stones pictured. In addition, she will have handouts for members that will summarize some of the art and symbolism of tombstone carvings.

Sheila is a past Director of Technical Information Services for the American Association for State and Local History and former Curator of Education at Belle Meade. She is a folklorist who conducts workshops and is a member of the Association for Gravestone Studies.

We hope you will plan to meet with us on Saturday, February 17, at the Ben West Public Library. Members often arrive before and stay after the program for networking and information swapping. Come on and join us, and have fun!

Supreme Court Records, Box 141, Middle Tennessee, 1860 Blankenship vs Wood

State of Tennessee

At a special term of the Chancery Court begun and held for the County of Bedford, in the 3rd Chancery District of the State aforesaid at the Court House in the town of Shelbyville on the 3rd Monday in October A. D. 1860 the Honorable B. L. Ridley Chancellor &c presiding, the following proceedings were had...

W. D. Blankenship & wife & others vs Edmond Word & others (Original Bill Filed March 7th 1859)

The Bill of Complaint of W. D. Blankenship and his wife Mary Jane Blankenship & W. W. Hastings citizens of Bedford County against Edmond Word, George Reagor, J. M. Hix, Alfred Campbell, Harman Landiss, James B. Reagor & Benjamin Mosley - all of whom are citizens of Bedford County, Tennessee To the Hon. B. L. Ridley Chancellor &c

Your orators & oratrix would respectfully represent to your Honor that Willie Hastings their father died in Bedford County sometime in 1837 seized and possessed of a tract of land lying in Bedford County, Civil District No. 22, on the waters of Flat Creek and adjoining the lands owned by William Hurst on the South by the lands once owned by Hugh C. Hurst & on the East & Southeast by the lands once owned by Josiah Hastings & on the West & North by the lands on which the widow Jane Word [Ed.'s Note: Something was left out of the record here.] and containing about ninety acres. At the death of Willis Hastings he left his widow Elizabeth Hastings & your Oratrix Mary Jane who has intermarried with your Orator W. D. Blankenship & your Orator W. W. Hastings, who were his only children & heirs at law - said Mary Jane will be 24 years old on the 6 of March 1859 & your Orator W. W. Hastings is just 26 years old - Your Orators would represent to your Honor, that one Edmond Word was appointed their Guardian by the County Court of Bedford County - & that some short time after his appointment, and when your complainants were infants he filed a bill as their Guardian in the Circuit Court of Bedford County to have the interest of Compts. in said land sold. At the time said petition was filed a bill as their Guardian in the Circuit Court of Bedford County to have the interest of Compts in said land sold. At the time said petition was filed by said Word to have the land sold the Mother of Compts held her dower on said land as the widow of their father. Complt. states that said bill was filed at the August Term of the Circuit Court for Bedford County in 1841 - and at the same term a decree was made ordering the Clerk of said Court to sell the same, but before said sale the matters mentioned in the bill of Word was referred to the Clerk of Court to report whether it was necessary to sell the land for a Division & whether the widow had been endowed & the minimum value per acre....

Complaining your Orators and Oratrixes show to your Honor that Cader Dement who was the Grandfather of Complainants (except Complainants Ganaway and Jones) departed this life sometime in the year 1849 in Rutherford County where he had long resided, having made and published his last will and testament, which last will was after the death of testator duly proven and recorded and two of the Executors, to wit, Warren Moore and E. Allen qualified as such, and entered in the discharge of their duties as such. A copy of last Will will be produced.....

McGowan, all likewise of Bedford County filed in the Chancery Court for Bedford County at Shelbyville...

**Supreme Court Records, Box 140, Middle Tennessee, 1860
Joshua Parks Will - Bedford County, Tennessee**

I Joshua Parks do make and publish this as my last will and testament hereby revoking and making void all other wills by me at any time made.

First, I direct that my funeral expenses and all my debts be paid as soon after my death as possible out of any money that I may die possessed of or that may first come into the hands of my executors.

Secondly, I give and bequeath to my wife Sarah Parks the Plantation on which I now live, my negro boy Jack and the negro girl Hannah together with as much of the stock of any kind, farming tools &c as will be necessary to carry on the farm for her use during her natural life with a sufficiency of provision of all kind for one year after my decease.

Thirdly, I give and bequeath to my daughter Sarah C. Parks one sorrel mare or one of equal value if she cannot obtain her, and a woman's saddle equal in value to the saddles given to my other daughters when they married, with a bed and furniture also of equal value with those furnished the other girls.

Fourthly, It is my will and I so order it that the balance of my property not included in the above legacies be equally divided among all my children or they may sell it and divide the proceeds of the sale among them at their discretion.

Fifthly, It is my will and I so direct that all the property willed as above to my wife Sarah Parks, at her death be sold and the proceeds of said sale to be equally divided among all my children; but if Sarah C. Parks infant daughter of John Parks deceased should not live till she arrives at legal age then her part of my estate to be equally divided among the rest of my children.

Lastly, I do hereby nominate and appoint Robert Parks my Executor. In witness whereof I do to this my will set my hand and seal the 26th May 1841.

Signed: Joshua Parks. Witness: Jacob Greer

A copy test of the original will of Joshua Parks which was proven by Jacob Greer at the November Term 1841 of Bedford Court and at said Term James Gammill proved the handwriting of Joshua Parks which will was admitted to record by said Court.

**LEGISLATIVE PETITION
GOVERNOR JOSEPH McMINN PAPERS
(Box 2, Folder 2)**

His Excellency Joseph McMinn, Governor of the State of Tennessee

The Petition of the undersigned humbly represent to your Excellency that at the Circuit Court of Overton County held on the second Monday of this Instant a certain James Brock late of the County of Knox was convicted of Horse stealing - And your petitioners state to your Excellency that the evidence on the part of the prosecution, with regard to the felonious intention of the said James Brock, was not very satisfactory and conclusive. It was also in proof on the part of the Defendant that for some considerable time prior to the commission of the act with which he was charged; that the said James Brock had been the subject of a degree of mental derangement or insanity - and respectable witnesses were introduced (some of whom had known the said James Brock from infancy) who all testified that he was a young man of excellent moral character previous to this Transaction. That his relations were all persons of unblemished reputation, free from any imputation of dishonesty. Viewing all circumstances that transpired respecting his accusation and conviction aforesaid, and impressed with a belief that all punishment has for its object the reformation of the individual we are inclined to think that can be attained more completely by pardoning than by punishing and infamousing the said James Brock we therefore beg leave to represent the said James Brock to your Excellency as a proper subject for Executive Clemency, and entreat your Excellency that the said James Brock on account of the dubious nature of the proof against him, the fairness of his former moral character, the prospects of his future reformation, and respectability of all his Relations, may receive a partion and be exempted from the infamous punishment the law inflicts on the perpetration of the Offense whereof he has been convicted-----

And your petitioners would humbly represent to your Excellency that the connections of this young man are highly respectable, and that his own character as far as they know, was unimpeachable till the commission of the offence of which he now stands convicted. Your petitioners have also been informed that evidence was given on the trial calculated to render the sanity of the mind & feloniousness of the intention of the delinquent at least doubtful. Considering these circumstances, the respectability of his connections in this part of the country (whose mortified feelings we cannot but communicate) and that the end of public punishment is no less for the reformation of the individual than for the sake of example to others, your petitioners cannot but join in representing the said James Brock to your excellency as a proper subject of executive clemency.

REVOLUTIONARY WAR PENSION APPLICATIONS

Joseph Vick #W 6364 BLWt 3833-160-55

1813. West Tennessee. Joseph Vick of Davidson County, Tennessee, who was a Private in the Company commanded by Captain Allcock of the Regiment commanded by Col. Armstrong in the North Carolina Line for 14 months from 1781, was inscribed on the roll of West Tennessee at the rate of \$46.66 per annum to commence on the 4th day of March 1831.

Joseph Vick was born February 19, 1762 in Sampson County, North Carolina. While a resident of that county he enlisted in June 1781 and served between fourteen and fifteen months as Private in Captains William Allcocks', Goodman's, Bailey's, Clem Hall's and Joseph Rhodes' Companies in Colonel Armstrong's North Carolina Regiment.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 22, 1832, at which time he was a resident of Davidson County, Tennessee, having moved there about 1805 from Sampson County, North Carolina. Joseph Vick's sister was Mary Equals who resided in Logan County, Kentucky in 1832.

Joseph Vick died December 16, 1844 in Davidson County, Tennessee. He married November 15, 1822 in Davidson County, Tennessee, Dianna or Dinah Kennedy. The marriage license was obtained November 13, 1822.

On account of the revolutionary war service of Joseph Vick, his widow Dinah or Dianna, was allowed pension on her application executed March 5, 1853, at which time she was living in South Harpeth, Davidson County, Tennessee and she then stated that she was eighty-four years of age.

In 1865, she was living in Williamson County, Tennessee, with her daughter, Mrs. Courtney Sawyer. In 1868, she stated that she was 105 years of age and was living in Williamson County, Tennessee. Charles M. Sawyer and Coston Sawyer were residents of Williamson County, Tennessee in 1865 and reference was also made to John S. Sawyer but their relationship to the soldier or widow was not given.

On February 10, 1866, A. M. Hughes, Agent for the State of Tennessee, forwarded to Honl. Joseph H. Barrett, Commissioner of Pensions, the following applications for pensions: Dinah Vick, James Edwards, David E. Willis, Thomas Foster, Wm. Treadway, M. E. Brandon and Catherine Marney.

On October 8, 1921, a telephone call from the office of Senator Cordell Hull (Tel. Br. of Capital #886) reported for the record of the husband of Dinah Vick, who died October 19, 1871, in Williamson County, Tennessee (Bellvue) and who received a pension until her death.

EPHRAIM POOL (Lucretia) #W1475

West Tennessee. Ephraim Pool of Montgomery County, Tennessee was a Private in the Company commanded by Captain Sumpter of the Regiment commanded by Singleton in the South Carolina Line for two years. He was inscribed on the roll of West Tennessee 4 March 1831.

13 August 1832. Ephraim Pool appeared before the Judge of the Circuit Court in Clarksville, Tennessee, and stated that he entered the service as a volunteer under Col. Mat. Singleton for the term of three months, which time he served. His captain was John Singleton son of the Colonel. Joseph Singleton was 1st Lt. He was in no engagements during this period. When he entered the service he resided in Camden District, South Carolina, 20 miles below Camden on the high hills of Santee and marched into the country above Camden, the principal object being to keep the Tories in subjection... He was acquainted with Col. Wade Hampton and also with his three brothers, Richard, John and William, one of whom was a Captain and the other two Lieutenants.

Washington Lane and Thomas Bell deposed in 1832 that they believed Ephraim Pool to be 77 years of age in March next.

Lucretia Pool, the widow of Ephraim Pool, made statement 2 October 1839 that she was 73 years old and was married to Ephraim Pool in the month of March 1781 or 1782 (she believes the former) in South Carolina about 20 miles below Camden. They removed to Georgia and remained a short time and then removed to Tennessee near forty years ago and now resides in Montgomery County... His death occurred 4 September 1834... She has no record of her marriage or her children... Her eldest son, William Pool, she is informed, resides somewhere in Mississippi and if living is now in his fifty seventh year according to her recollection. Lucretia Pool signed with an [X] before R. L. Gupton on 2 October 1839 who made oath that he was acquainted with Ephraim and Lucretia Pool and that they raised a family of children but their age is unknown to him but William Pool was a man grown when he first knew the family and he is reputed to be the oldest son of Ephraim and Lucretia Pool on 2 October 1839.

Lucretia Pool was placed on the pension roll on 4 March 1836.

On 16 December 1839, Cave Johnson deposed that, if his recollection was right, it appears in her papers that she was married before the year 1794...

1840 CENSUS OF ROBERTSON COUNTY, TENNESSEE

The 1840 census of Robertson County, Tennessee, is contributed by Byron and Barbara Sistler, 1712 Natchez Trace, Nashville, TN 37212.

The figures following each name represent composition of the family by age and sex. Each digit stands for a number in the column on the original schedule (zeros omitted after the last number inserted).

Columns on the schedules are in order, males 0-5 years, males 5-10, males 10-15, males 15-20, males 20-30, males 30-40, males 40-50, males 50-60, males 60-70, males 70-80, males 80-90, males 90-100, males over 100. To the right of these are 13 identical columns for females.

A household with figures as follows: 120001-103001001

means it was composed of 1 male under 5, 2 males 5-10, and 1 male 30-40; 1 female under 5, 3 females 10-15, 1 female 30-40 and 1 female 60-70.

This transcription does not include statistical detail on Blacks, either free or slave, though "free colored" are shown by name where they were heads of household. You will notice a number of names followed by 0-0. These are Blacks who fit the "free colored" category.
