PROPERTY AND PROPERTY RIGHTS

An understanding of property and property rights is a tremendous aid to the genealogical researcher. Information found in land records can be relied upon as being correct because of the care and concern that our forefathers had with land and its devolution to their heirs and next of kin.

This article deals with some of the basic concepts of property law and the roots of those concepts in the English Common Law.

Origin of Real Property Law

The English Common Law is the origin of real property law of all states with the exception of Louisiana. That law began with the Norman Conquest in 1066. The concepts that it embodied were more akin to Germanic law than Roman law, which was the basis of the law in France and other Latin countries.

Distinction between Real and Personal Property

The main principle that the researcher needs to know on the front end is: In the English Common Law there are two sets of property law -- real property law and personal property law. There were two sets of laws, two sets of courts (courts of law and equity or chancery), and two sets of final arbiters (the king of the courts of law and the chancellor of the church of the equity courts).

The English held their real property in great esteem and gave it an exalted position in their legal system. A complex system of real property law emerged that contained much greater restrictions than placed on personal property. They felt that all personal property ethereal would some day fade and pass away, but the land would always be there and, therefore, merited their protection.

Crimes against property were punished more severely than crimes against persons. An example of the difference between the philosophies of the English and the Scots is reflected in the versions of the Lord's Prayer. The Presbyterians say "forgive us our debts" while the Methodist say "forgive us our trespasses," trespasses being, of course, a real property crime.

The Ultimate Giver and Taker

The State (the king/sovereign) was/is the ultimate giver and the ultimate taker of land. In the beginning of the English Common Law, the King granted land to his generals/lords, and as each died, he would "re-grant" the land to another of his choosing. The custom of re-granting ended in 1290 in favor of land passing to the eldest son of the general/lord.

There were no wills or deeds because land was not owned in the sense of ownership as we know it today. It was held in "tenure" in exchange for rents and military service.

If a tenant were to die without heirs to receive the land, it would revert to the state/king/sovereign. This process was known as escheat. Escheat laws are still around today.

The concept of land ownership as we know it evolved into the English Common Law in the mid 1500's. So, it was pretty well entrenched by the time that our ancestors came to America. The state/king/sovereign remained the ultimate giver. He (through the legislative body) said how land could be owned.

Today we can own land because the state says that we can, but the state also tells us what strings there are attached to such ownership.

Importance of the Bloodline

It was extremely important to the English that land stay in the bloodline from whence it came. The King figured that his grant was a personal favor to his general/lord, and he intended for the land to be a continu-

ing benefit to the family of that general/lord. Initially, it passed to the eldest son by right of primogeniture. By the time that the English Common Law came to America, land was passing to all children equally.

Remember that the king gave Blackacre to his general. He did not give it to the general's wife. Remember, also, that unless she were related, the wife was not of the same bloodline. She, therefore, could not inherit Blackacre. It had to stay in the General's bloodline.

In order not to leave the wife completely out in the cold, the law began to recognize her right to a *part* of the land. That right was called "dower." It was a right only and was not ownership. She was entitled to one third of the real property for life. She, thus, took a "life estate," which is exactly what it says -- a right to use the land, or at least one third of it, for her lifetime, with the "remainder" going to the children or other heirs at her death.

The law also recognized that the widow might need a place to live. So, it invented the concept of "homestead," which gave her the right to live in the house, or at least a part of it. Homestead was limited by a dollar amount and could be forsaken by the widow should she abandon it by going elsewhere to live.

The reason that you find divisions of property at the wife's later death is that the land did not vest in the heirs until such time. Then the children would divvy it up among themselves.

Of course, all of this is not to say that the husband/general/lord could not leave the land to his wife if he wanted to. He could, but seldom did, because the time honored custom was that she should have only a

dower interest, that is, one third for life. Most wills read: "I leave Blackacre to my wife for her lifetime and then to my children." Or maybe he left her only one third of Blackacre.

Real Property as a Non-Probate Asset

Under English Common Law (and under Tennessee law today) when a man died, his assets were handled two different ways according to whether the assets were real or personal. His personal property passed to his administrator/executor to be sold to pay his debts and divided among his heirs. Ownership of these assets was/is suspended until all debts and costs of administration of the estate have been paid. Once such items have been paid and a division made, ownership vests in the heirs.

Not so for real property. Ownership in real property did/does vest at the moment of death. The English Common Law called it "no gap in seisin." The heirs took/take title from the moment of death and were/are entitled to possess the land and receive the benefits from it from that moment on.

Land was/is immune from claims of creditors. It did/does not have to be sold to pay creditors unless the creditors bring suit to show that personal property is insufficient to pay debts.

In your research don't expect to find real property on the inventory of the estate of your ancestor. It won't be there, because it is non-probate. Ownership vested at the moment of death, and it was not subject to claims of creditors. A division of the property may be in the records of another court other than the probate court because dividing land was/is not a probate matter. Probate concerns itself with personal property only.

Descent and Distribution

Another way of looking at probate and non-probate is to consider the meaning of "descent and distribution." Real property descends, and personal property is distributed. As we said above, real property descends to the heir immediately at death,

while personal property has to go through the administrative process. Once the administrative process (paying debts and dividing shares), that which is left can be distributed to the heirs.

The terms "laws of descent and distribution" should be familiar to most researchers. There were/may be literally two sets of laws, one governing personal property and one governing real property. The main difference is that the spouse cannot inherit real property, and therefore was left out of the laws of descent. The spouse could, of course, inherit personal property (usually a child's share) and was, thus, included in the laws of distribution.

Undivided Interest in Property

The English Common Law recognized, as does modern law, that more than one person may own a piece of property. Those multiple owners have what we call "undivided interests" in that property. It is undivided until someone takes the initiative to divide the property up (partition) among the owners.

The concept of undivided interests is also complicated. There are three kinds of undivided interests. Let us consider first "tenants in common" and "joint tenants with right of survivorship." When two or more people own a piece of property as tenants in common, upon the death of one, his share goes to his heirs. During his life he can sell or otherwise dispose of his share of the property. He has a right to use the property in any way he sees fit, subject to the other owner's having the same right.

On the other hand, two people may own property (like a bank account), which will pass in its entirety upon the death of the first to die. That's a joint tenancy with right of survivorship. It makes a difference.

Under the English Common Law most undivided interests in property were deemed to be joint tenancies with right of survivorship. Because the heirs of all except the last to die were left out, the law shifted to being deemed to be tenancies in common, as they are today.

The other undivided interest in property is the "tenancy by the entirety," which is

between husband and wife. It is like joint tenancy with right of survivorship in that sole ownership passes to the survivor. But unlike a joint tenancy with right of survivorship, one owner (husband or wife) cannot sell without the other joining in the sale.

There were few tenancies by the entirety during the days of the English Common Law and early American law. To own property in this way was contrary to the concept of maintaining property in the same bloodline. Obviously, if the wife took property by survivorship, that property passed to her bloodline and out of the husband's bloodline. That for the most part was a no no.

Marital Interests in Property

We have already seen that Dower was the wife's right to receive a one third interest in her husband's real property for the rest of her life (life estate). This right was her marital interest, as was her homestead.

The husband, too, was entitled to a marital interest in property owned by his wife. His interest was called "curtesy." It was also a life estate, but was a life estate in all of the real property owned by the wife, as opposed to the one third that the wife received.

But there was one mitigating circumstance in the advantage the husband had over the wife. There had to have been a child born alive of the marriage in order for a husband to receive his curtesy. On the other hand, the wife's right was absolute regardless of whether or not a child was born of the marriage.

Conclusion

Real property laws have their origin in antiquity and for that reason are in many respects archaic. But they served a purpose and were based on the philosophy and the customs of their time of origin. Some have outlived their usefulness, but they still control our lives and the devolution of property to our heirs.

ALSO, the Home place, containing 145 1-2 acres east, and 7 1-2 acres west of the Nolensville turnpike, being 153 acres in all. The late residence of Alex. Buchanan, dec'd, on which is a valuable Brick Dwelling and out houses.

Also the Williams place fronting on the turnpike to the east 111 1-2 acres.

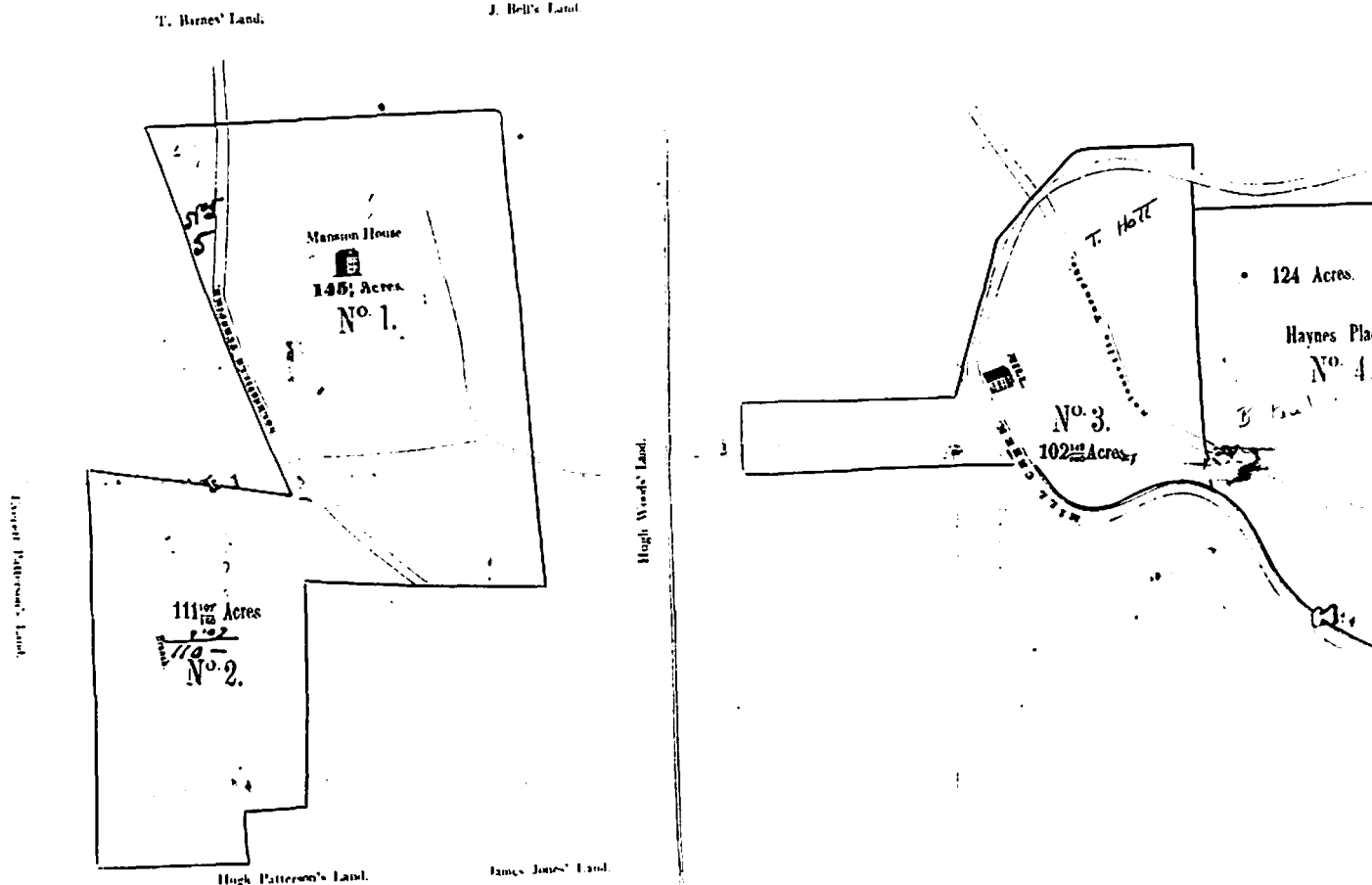
And also at the same time and place, by virtue of a decree in the case of Mary Jane Haynes, ex parte, a TRACT OF LAND containing 124 acres, part of said tract assigned and set apart to James Haynes, dec'd, as one of the heirs of Alex. Buchanan, dec'd, on which is situated two good Cabins, two never failing Springs, about 60 acres cleared under a good fence, and the balance in timber of the best quality. A plat of said lands will be found below.

The terms of sale are a credit of one, two and three years, without interest, the purchaser giving bond and good security, and a lien will be retained till the purchase money is paid.

This Petition of Mary J. Haynes, an infant under the age of twenty-one, who sues by her Guardian James S. Haynes a citizen of Giles County, State of Tennessee.

Petition to sell land

Your Petitioner, through her Guardian shows unto your Honor, that in the month of August 1843, Jane F. Haynes, wife of Thos. W. Haynes, departed this life, in Davidson County, Tennessee, leaving your petitioner, then a few months old, her sole heir, to a certain tract of land, lying in Davidson County, Tennessee on Mill Creek, in Civil District No. 3, ... of the tract of Alexander Buchanan, deceased, which was divided amongst his heirs...running to a point in the Centre of main Mill Creek ..the County of Williamson, near the Concord Baptist ... House, ... containing by estimation one hundred & twenty-nine acres. ...rights and estate of your petitioner are subject to the life estate of her father...Your petitioner states that she has no estate beyond the remainder interest shown above; except to an undivided eighth part of the lands of her grandfather Alex. Buchanan, which was assigned to the widow...which is now in controversy.

Your Petitioner further states that her father, Thomas W. Haynes, soon after the death of Petitioners Mother sold & conveyed to James S. Haynes of Giles County, Tennessee, the Guardian for Petitioner, his life estate ...and having consigned Petitioner to the guardianship of his father, James S. Haynes, removed to the City of Charleston in South Carolina, where he has established himself permanently.

SELECTED CEMETERIES IN WILSON COUNTY, TENNESSEE

These family graveyards scattered throughout Wilson county bear witness to the lives of long ago. They were once set aside in sorrowing reverence and tended with great care. Now most of them are abandoned, overgrown, and in some cases desecrated.

History and genealogy can be found in them. They provide family data often not otherwise available. The inscriptions are often poignant and revealing as to the lives of these early settlers. Heartbreak is still conveyed in many of them.

The intent of this book is to preserve the information still to be found in these cemeteries. This has been done through identifying remaining tombstones and recollections of remaining older residents. Regrettably, it was not possible to identify all of the graves.

BARTON-BAIRD CEMETERY

(Located off the Beckwith Road on the Dempsey Curry Farm)

ABOUT OUR SEPTEMBER SPEAKER

Dorothy Williams Potter, a member of our Middle Tennessee Society, has been collecting awards for achievement for 20 years or more. CIVIL WAR LETTER WRITTEN BY JAMES ROBINSON OGDEN

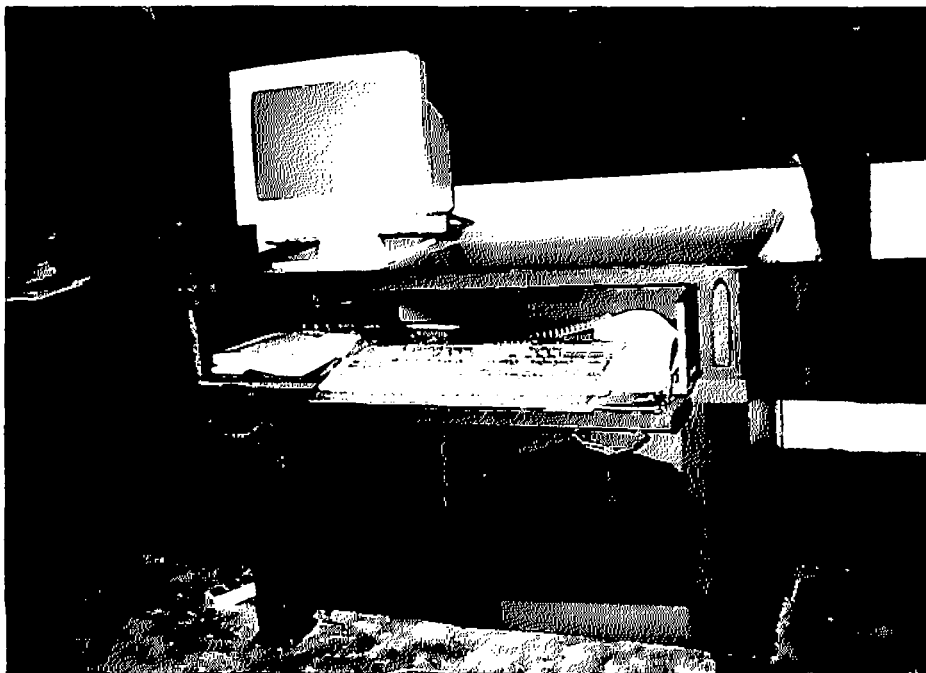

"... I have several things from my paternal grandparents which I proudly display and perhaps someone else might think interesting. I never did know these grandparents, who lived in Knoxville, because I was a Texan (a poor one at that) and never did venture across the state line until many years into marriage! When we moved to Tennessee, there were few cousins or aunts/uncles left of my father's folks. His father, James Robinson Ogden, was one of 8 children of James Ogden and Catherine Robinson who came from England, settled in Ohio, and was given a commission at the beginning of the Civil War if he would leave college and join the army. He was in the Quartermaster Corps, stationed in Chattanooga...

"His letter to his sister, Kate - back in Ohio, is one of my treasures...about Lincoln's assassination and the Union soldiers returning home.

"He fell in love with my grandmother (who was French Swiss, born in Brazil) when he first saw her singing in the choir in Knoxville. She, Elise Porta Ogden, has an interesting background too. One that I have followed up more thoroughly than his. She, a sister, and a brother were born in Recife, Brazil. They were left orphans when their father, Francois Porta and wife, Marie Tauxe, both died. They were brought to Tennessee and grew up with cousins in the Knoxville area.

"...One treasure I have recently acquired is a desk (re-styled for my computer) which was originally a pump organ that Grandmother Ogden's brother, Eugene, my great uncle owned. He also served in the Civil War - a Confederate soldier, held prisoner in Indiana. James R. O. was a Union soldier who married Eugene's sister, Elise Porta, my grandmother. My deceased cousin said 'That's what the Civil War did to our family!'



"Among other articles of the Ogdens which I now own are: a lady and gentleman chair and couch, his old office chair (he became president of the Knoxville Iron Works) some articles from his desk, sterling silver (service for 12) - which was her Silver Anniversary present from him in 1891, etc.

"James Robinson Ogden died in August 1891, his wife, Elise in 1932.

"My father lived to be six months past 100 - which I plan to do!..."

I was in Greenville - near the home of Andrew Johnson when the news of Lincoln's assassination came. He lives in a poor miserable little house - with the sign "A Johnson Tailor" still hanging from the door. I hope he will make a good president - but I have no confidence in him - he is a very ambitious and unscrupulous man - but as he has attained the height of his ambition I hope he will be a good man —

Knoxville Tenn
April 23, 1865

My beloved Kate -

William arrived here last night. He is looking very well - very much better than I expected to find him. I have been up into the eastern part of the state, had a ride of several hundred miles horseback and enjoyed myself first rate. It has done me good. William has commenced buying vouchers. He commenced yesterday and has bought more than a thousand dollars worth of them. I think he will make it pay to stay here several weeks - he appears to be in fine [state of] health.

I do not think I shall stay very much longer in the Q. M. Dept. I am looking for a good RR position. I have a promise of the second best on the Railroad but there are a great many "slips 'twixt the cup & the lip" but I have no doubt of doing well in some capacity. Perhaps I shall go home some time during the summer. I do not think that we shall go to North Carolina as I expected a few weeks ago.

We had a splendid Row on the river last night. William was with us but he was not strong enough to row. I was away from Knoxville when I should have written you so I write as soon as I returned. Every day large bands of Rebs are coming in to give themselves up - They are laying around town - don't know what to do - and afraid to go home lest the Union men should kill them. Some of them are shot every day. Yesterday a party begged to be taken under guard as they could not walk on the streets in safety. If Lincoln had lived this would not have occurred but they would have been able to go home in peace. An awful retribution has come upon them - and I can't pity them.

I was in Greenville near the home of Andrew Johnson when the news of Lincoln's assassination came. He lives in a poor miserable little house with the sign "A. Johnson, Tailor" still hanging from the door. I hope he will make a good president but I have no confidence in him - he is a very ambitious and unscrupulous man - but as he has attained the height of his ambition, I hope he will be a good man.

Give my love to all at home.

A FEW ITEMS OF HISTORY BY GRANDMOTHER DANIEL

The following historical data was written 15 December 1931 by Lydia Margaret Chew Daniel, born 2nd August 1847 in Lewiston, N. Y.; died 2 August 1936 in Dickson County, TN where she is buried in the Rock Church Cemetery. She was a daughter of William Chew and his fourth wife Hannah Whitcomb. She came to Nashville, Tennessee during the Civil War and after the war married Civil War veteran Robert Daniel on 6 January 1867. Robert had come to Tennessee from Cobb County, GA looking for his wife, Irena Jones Daniel and family. His wife and young daughter died leaving him a widower in Nashville with two young sons. Robert Daniel was born 16 January 1825 in Anderson County, South Carolina; he died in Dickson County, TN on 23 December 1890, leaving Lydia Margaret with seven children to raise. She was twenty-two years younger than Robert.

Great Grandmother Hannah Trowbridge Whitcomb came from Vermont, was a missionary teacher to the Indians in western New York for several years. She taught the women to spin as well as reading and writing. Her home was with the missionary preacher's family, Mr. Rockwood from Massachusetts. She married William Chew --- three fourths white, a man with an education and a leader in church work. She was a stepmother to several children, who were devoted to her and us little ones --- two sisters and three brothers. I remember being hauled to school over the snow by a half brother when I was very young. When there were three of us, we went out on Lake Ontario to Syracuse by steamer to visit Grandmother in Homer. We had to travel in something like an omnibus, called a stage. It might have been in 1854. My grandmother had married a Mr. Clark who was quite a musician and one Aunt Sara Clark played the organ. We had some fine times singing. They named my little baby brother Clark Whitcomb. My father was not with us. He was often a delegate to conventions, and it seems he came by to take us home to Niagara County. When he passed away I was eleven years old. Little sister Dollie was about two. My mother sent me to live with a friend who taught music 60 miles from home. It was a cruel experience, altho there were several little children in the family. After a few months I was allowed to visit home. An Uncle, Charles Clark, played the flute for me to play church music. I was proud of myself. I was sent to school with others. They were able to have a hired girl. My mother died when I was only fourteen. Guy was sent to Mr. Lord; Clark was taken by Mr. Hill down on Lake Ontario. Bro. Thad was adopted by Mr. & Mrs. Ayres, a mile from Lewiston, where I found a home with a widow; so we saw each other at school. Little Dollie was the first to go. My Uncle Pliny Whitcomb and Grandma from Homer, gave her to Mrs. Starr at the R. R. Station, but we seldom met her. Guy went off about 100 miles and was educated. Church people helped me with clothes, and I seldom missed my lessons. I would get up before day to do the washing. A piano was in the house

but I was never allowed to go near it -- she was nervous. My life at Lewiston was dull, but just what was best for me to keep up with my lessons, and I attended church regularly.

The Union Army considered the war about over, so people who had property in the South began to go back. A young couple with a baby paid \$10.00 per month for me to go with them to Nashville. Addison Willey had a fruit nursery near the city.

Gen. Hood took his army within a few miles of the city, where the shells from Fort Negley could reach them. They screamed like the fire alarm. We were between the intrenchments, but the fort never aimed at the homes.

We were down in the cellar during a battle. A cannon ball passed thro one house. It was in Dec. just before Christmas. A fearful sleet storm covered the ground so that horses could not walk.

Some of the Army were Texas Rangers, ragged and nearly barefooted, a sad hopeless crowd, hungry and suffering. Gen. Hood retreated; many of his men never went back South.

I found a home with a lady who was an invalid and needed a girl for housework. She kept a colored cook a part of the time. Once she had a refugee widow and little boy, but her grown son took her back to Georgia. She was a Union woman. Maj. Goff and wife gave me a chance to take music lessons, but the cholera in Nashville sent people flying to the country. They lived four miles from the city. A sister with four children made their home for a few months with Mrs. Goff. Col. Hayward was a native of Mass. but was in the Southern Army. He had property in the South -- my life was one of service, for her aged mother, Mrs. Erwin, came to live there. She had been in St. Louis during the war. When night came I escaped to my bed in the attic, where an old harp was my companion. No one complained about my singing. Sometimes we had to do our own cooking, as servants were uncertain. It was a treat to be where the families were all musicians.

I was invited to work with the Fannings who had two schools five miles from Nashville -- a young ladies Academy. It was where I attended church and met Mr. Daniel. Someone warned me not to go there. People were bitter against the Campellities (so called). Tolbert Fanning was a teacher in the men's college which was called the Franklin College. Mrs. Fanning was head of the girl's school.

I became a stepmother and worked in the field with them, cutting cornstalks and sprouts. We made our home on David Lipscomb's farm in a log cabin without a glass window. I cooked with an oven and lid by the fireplace; taught the boys to read and write.

We lived on the Lipscomb farm several years; all of us had chills and fever so bad we had to move. We had two white neighbors a part of the time.

Tim Barfield could not stand the chills and moved back to Davidson County. We moved to Dickson Co. with three boys, John, Arthur Charlton and Robert

as they could not grow. Mr. Lipscomb owed us about \$1,000.00 when we moved. The school house was three miles from us. Allsey and Alva rode a horse, about three months a part of the time.

Mr. Daniel was partially paralyzed for over a year, but was able to walk about the farm with a cane. He died sitting in a chair Dec. 23. Allsey lived near Nashville. Alva lived with a neighbor. Charley and Bob went to some of the neighbors for help. It was after night; we told Kate he had gone to sleep; she took pains to wait on him, to tie his shoes. Alva went out the house to mourn, so Kate would not cry. James Stanley died in eight months, very suddenly. My family consisted of five sons and three daughters.

I have not used dates, because I am forgetful.

JACKSON COUNTY, TENNESSEE LAND ENTRY BOOK

Transcribed by Irene M. Griffey, C. G.

With a dearth of records for Jackson County, TN (formed 1801 from Indian Lands and a portion of Smith County), this Land Entry Book dated 1802 - 1805 will be helpful in establishing the location of many early settlers in that area.

The microfilmed copy of this book is well hidden in the Tennessee State Library & Archives Record Group 50, Series 2, Roll 17, Book 54. It is labeled Middle Tennessee Entry Books 1802-1806. It is recommended that the microfilm be consulted whenever an item of interest is identified.

Coding: W = Warrant #; L = Location; A = Acres; D = Date land was entered in the Entry Taker's office. Warrants, when they can be found, will add an explanation to the recipient's entitlement to the land.

JOHN RAYBURN: Enters 640 acres of land by virtue of his settlement on Flat Creek a branch of R[oar]ing River beginning at a beech standing on the East line of said creek running thence North 30 [degrees] West 60 poles to 3 black oaks marked thus JR thence S 60 W 30 poles thence North 60 E 80 poles to the creek thence up said creek and East from the beginning for compliment.

W [none] L 1 A 640 D March 9, 1802

JAMES LOCK: Enters two hundred acres of land Jackson County, Tennessee State, lying on Jennings Creek about one mile and a quarter below the big Spring, beginning on a Beech and Elm on the bank of the creek running down the creek a west course with the first line, then to run as the law directs.

W [none] L 2 A 200 D March 9, 1802

GARRET FITZGERALD: Enters 170 acres of land lying on Doe Creek running up & down for compliment Enclude Armstrongs & Gourds improvement. [Note in margin:] "Made stand by order of Fitzgerald this 1 day of August 1802.

W 1932 L 3 A 170 D March 9, 1802

GARRET FITZGERALD: Enters 670 acres of land lying on the dividing ridge between Doe & Flynn's Creek including my improvement on the ridge on a Pond.

W 1932 L 4 A 670 D March 9, 1802

GARRET FITZGERALD: Enters two hundred and seventy acres of land in Jackson County lying and being on the East side of Flynn's Creek joining his own line, then running as the law directs being a part of a warrant of No. 1457.

W 1457 L 5 A 100 D March 9, 1802

JOHN RUSSELL: Enters 300 acres of land joining William Russell's in Jackson County running as the law directs.

W [none] L 6 A 300 D March 9, 1802

HENRY REYBOURN: Enters two hundred acres of land on Flat Cr. the Eastern waters of R. River beginning at a formedable corner of John Reybourns near a bluff of Laurel on the East side of Flat Cr. running sd cr & up the West Fork of said cr near to Thompson's fence, then East & South for compliment so as to include two hundred acres.

W [none] L 7 A 200 D March 9, 1802

RICHth PATTON: Enters two hundred acres of land lying on a South branch of Spring Creek on the east side of the creek at a black oak running up said creek so as to include the said Patton's improvement.

W [none] L 8 A 200 D March 9, 1802

JOSEPH RUSSELL: Enters Six Hundred and forty acres of land lying on the waters of Jennings Creek in Jackson County, joining Buckner Russell's line on the West boundary line and running as the law directs for compliment, so as to include the said Russell improvement.

W [none] L 9 A 640 D March 9, 1802

JOSEPH LOCK: Enters a tract of land lying and being in Jackson County beginning as follows: beginning at an elm and two Sycamores it being Thaners corner on the north side of Cumberland river about two hundred yds above the mouth of Roaring River running also sd Thaners line so as to include a part of a large knob thence up the river for compliment as the law directs so as to include 640 acres.

JOSEPH LOCK: Enters a tract of land in Jackson County, State of Tennessee lying and being on the south side of Cumberland River beginning on Hickman's south line and running up the creek for compliment as the law directs so as to include 200 acres.

GARRET FITZGERALD: Enters a tract of land in Jackson County, State of Tennessee, lying and being on Doe Creek beginning above Armstrong's improvement & running down sd creek on both sides so as to include two hundred acres of land.

GARRET FITZGERALD: assignee of William Micther Rizes(?) and sd in page. Enters a tract of land in Jackson County, State of Tennessee, being on a branch of Doe Creek beginning at the fork of the Hurricane ridge and running down sd branch so as to include James Ishan's spring and improvement.

W 1232 L 13 A 50 D March 12, 1802

DAVID HARBERT: Enters 400 acres of land in Jackson County lying on the dividing ridge between Flinn's Creek and Roaring River joining an entry of Garret Fitzgeralds on the South running as the law directs for compliment. David Harbert, Locator.

RESOURCES FOR ROBERTSON COUNTY RESEARCH

Robertson County Tennessee was formed in 1796 from what was then known as Tennessee County, North Carolina. We will be celebrating our 200th birthday in 1996 along with the State of Tennessee's birthday.

The records of Robertson County were moved from the Courthouse during a major Courthouse restoration in 1982. The Robertson County Archives was created at that time and has been maintained largely through volunteer efforts of Retired Teachers, D.A.R. and D.A.C. members. The Archives is presently staffed with one part time County paid employee and two Green Thumb workers. We have recently accumulated enough donations to purchase a computer so are looking forward to creating many good indexes for our patrons use!

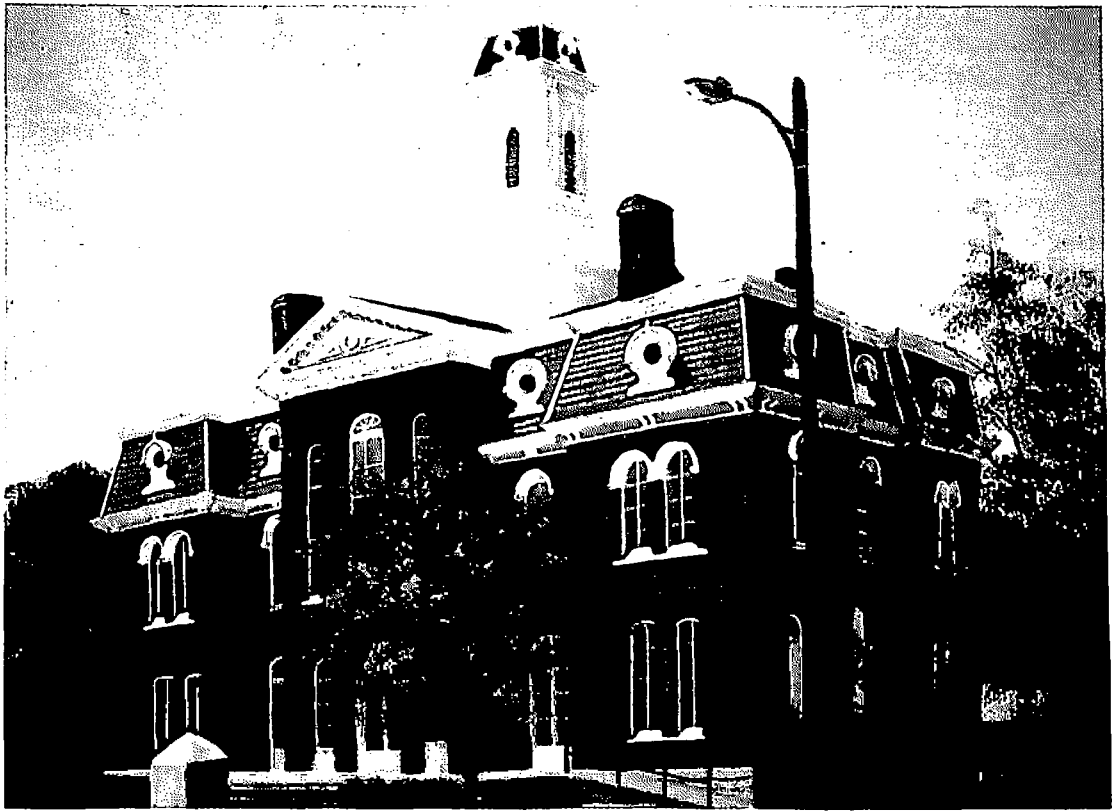

SEARCHING SMITH COUNTY RECORDS

The majestic Smith County Courthouse reigns over the town square in Carthage, Tennessee. The Second Empire style structure was built in 1877 and placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1979.



A genealogical comrade of mine once proclaimed that she was positive everybody in the world migrated into Smith County. Well, not everybody, but certainly many of the early pioneers did settle along the fertile creek and river bottoms or pass through on the trek westward. We are fortunate that most of the records that preserve the saga of our ancestors have survived the Yankee occupation of the courthouse during the War and a roaring inferno that destroyed most of the town of Carthage in 1885.

Smith County is unique in that it was populated from both the east and the west. After the Indian menace was brought to an end by the Nickajack campaign in 1794, settlers expanded eastward from the older counties of Davidson and Sumner and westward with the surge of pioneers crossing the

mountains from Virginia, the Carolinas and other eastern states. Records pertaining to the people living in the area prior to Smith County's creation in 1799 will be found in Sumner and Davidson county.

The original boundaries of the county encompassed much of what is now Trousdale, Dekalb, Putnam, Jackson, Clay and Macon counties. Hence, records prior to the establishment of these respective counties will most likely be located in Smith County after 1799. The same legislative act created both Smith and Wilson counties with all of the land west of the Caney Fork and south of the Cumberland River falling into the latter until the line was redrawn in 1801.

Practically every aspect of the pioneer's life was regulated by the justices of the court. If a man pur-

chased property, the transaction was certified and ordered to be recorded by the court; "personalized" stock marks were registered and duly recorded; fees charged by the inn keeper, the ferryman, the distiller, the merchant -- all came under the jurisdiction of the "squires" who were, at that time, appointed by the governor; both civil and criminal cases were first heard before the local justice in his respective district; the court appointed men to work on the roads and serve in the militia; the veteran and/or his widow appeared before the court to make application for military pensions; and, finally, when a man's final summons came, the august body of justices appointed an administrator or an executor and a "jury of good men" to see that the necessary provisions for the widow and her family were made.

The minutes are extant from the first Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions which convened at the home of Tilman Dixon on December 16, 1799.

With the exception of Book I, which has been reconstructed from court records, all of Smith County land records are extant and provide a wealth of information not only of an ancestor's land holdings but also his migrations and the area of the county in which he lived. This is especially important information when researching in Smith County. The Cumberland River serves as a natural barrier and, in the early days, there was limited communication between the "north side" and the "south side" so families with the same surname living on different sides of the river may bear no relationship. Many Revolutionary War land grants issued by the State of North Carolina are also recorded in the early records. The deed books, located in the County Register's office, are well indexed and a pleasure with which to work.

The last will and testament of an ancestor is one of the most valuable "finds" a genealogist can make. In Smith county these records are duly recorded in the will books with many of the original documents being extant. Through the diligent efforts of F. C. Key, all of the wills have been copied, either from the original when available or from the book, and compiled into a master book from which copies may be obtained. The wills and estate settlements are now under the jurisdiction of the Chancery Court and are located in that office in the courthouse.

Unfortunately, all Smith County marriage records prior to 1838, the year the legislature passed an act requiring that they be recorded in a permanently bound book, have vanished. The story goes that a well-meaning courthouse official, bent on house cleaning, loaded many old papers onto wagons to be hauled to the river and dumped. A Mr. Allen at Dixon

Springs got word of the atrocious deed and rushed posthaste to Carthage to rescue the records. If only his horse had been a bit faster, perhaps the marriages might have been saved! There are a few scattered records beginning in 1838, but most of those found in the first book are from 1850 on. Other court records, pension applications, family Bibles and newspaper accounts must be relied upon when searching for early marriages. The Smith County Historical and Genealogical Society Newsletter solicits and publishes any early documented marriages submitted by its members.

Chancery Court cases along with the supporting depositions often contain very valuable genealogical information. The cases themselves are entered into minute books which are indexed and are available on microfilm. The original books are stored in the archives with the exception of those from approximately 1900 until the present which are in the Chancery Court Clerk's office.

Under the direction of county historian, Ervin Smith, a group of volunteers worked with the loose papers which had reposed for years in duty old boxes in a basement room. After much unrolling, pressing, even ironing, they have been tenderly placed in flat folders. Every case was perused and all names recorded on an attached card. Each folder was assigned a number and stored in numbered boxes after being microfilmed by the State Archives. As soon as the task of entering the names into a computer to be alphabetized is completed, the microfilm will be released to the public. Hopefully, the dream of a Smith County Archives will someday become a reality and not only these papers but also all of the original records will be available to researchers.

The F. C. Key Genealogical Room of the Smith County Library contains a vast amount of material for such a small rural library. There are many published family histories and abstracts

of the wills, deed through 1850, marriages, census and cemetery records. The collection also contains resource materials for many other counties and states. All of the court records are on microfilm enabling the researcher to go to the original source.

All available issues of early county newspapers have been microfilmed including issues of the *Carthage Gazette* 1809-1819 and miscellaneous issues from the *Carthage Casket*, *Carthage Vidette* and *Smith County Record*. The *Carthage Courier* is complete from 1913-190. A vertical file containing miscellaneous and family records has been contributed to by various members of the Historical Society and other interested persons. The library is open Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday, 8:30-12:00, 1:00-4:00; Saturday 8:30-2:00, closed Wednesday. County offices in the courthouse are open Monday - Friday 8:00-4:00 and Saturday until noon.

Articles of interest to those whose "roots" are in this area are published quarterly by the Smith County Historical and Genealogical Society. Members are entitled to free queries and are encouraged to submit any well-documented material for publication. Dues are \$12.50 annually with monthly meetings (July and August excepted) on the third Monday at the Smith County Library at 7:00 p.m. winter months, 7:30 p.m. during daylight saving time.

In a letter written in the 1880's to Dr. John W. Bowen of Gordonsville, Joseph W. Allen states that in his mind's eye he sees Smith Countians as a "generous people from whom myself and family always received kindness, friendship, and unstinted hospitality. I am glad I was born in such a county and among such people." It is our fervent wish that, over a hundred years later, you, our visiting researcher, may experience the same sentiments in your heart and rejoice that your heritage lies in our fair county.

WHERE IS SHAWNEE SPRING?

Early in 1991 one of our members inquired as to the location of "Shawnee Spring," which was cited in a family history found loose in Davidson County, TN Chancery Court papers. Naturally, because of where this history was located, it was assumed "Shawnee Spring" must be in or near Davidson Co.

The history was published in Vol. IV #4 of this quarterly (p. 157). We wondered if one of our members might be able to answer this puzzling question.

Now member Nancy B. Curtsinger of Harrodsburg, KY has come forward with this answer. She sent us a column "Historically Speaking" by Jim Miller of the Harrodsburg Historical Society, published in *The Harrodsburg Herald* on June 11, 1992. This reveals that Shawnee Run and Shawnee Spring were part of the Harrodsburg community.

Ironically the very same four Thompson brothers discussed in the history found at the Metro Archives here are mentioned in this column as having settled with their families on Shawnee Run soon after the Revolution.

Answers to questions do indeed come in mysterious ways!

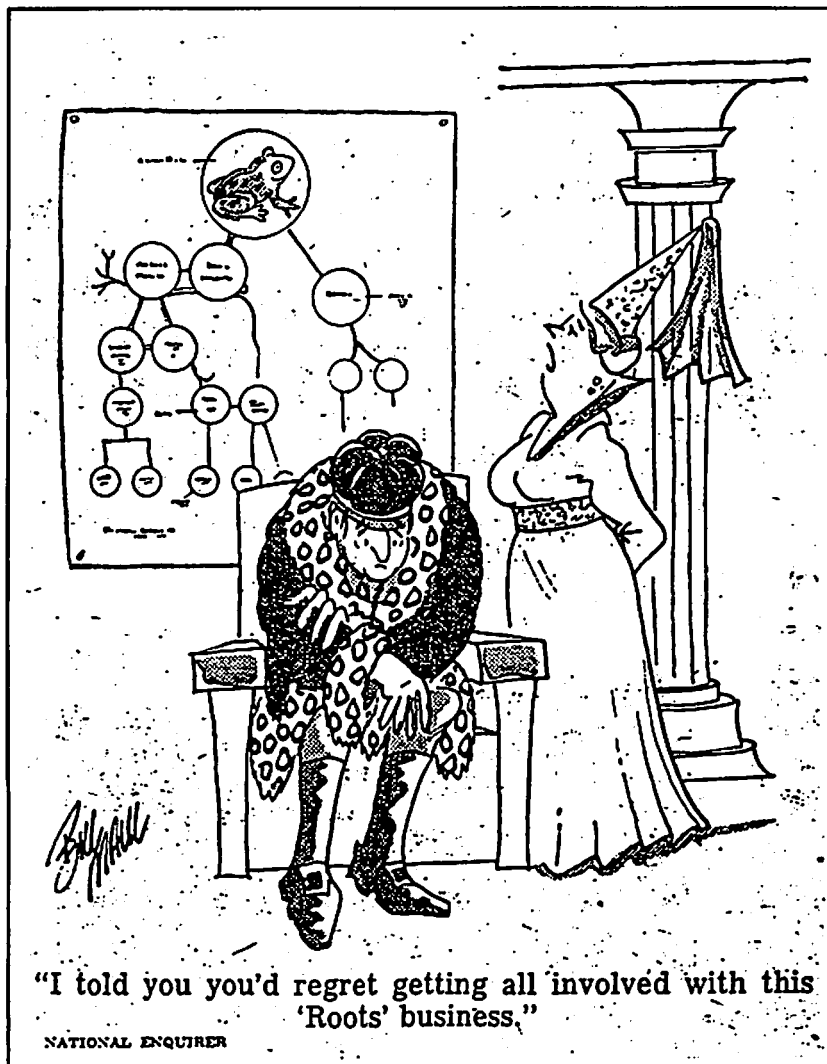
