The next meeting of the Middle Tennessee Genealogical Society will be on March 15 at 1:00 at the FiftyForward Center, 174 Raines Avenue, Nashville, with a program by Joe Spann, a member of the Sons of the American Revolution and a native Floridian, now living in Gallatin and working in the music industry. For 21 years Mr. Spann was the director of the Polk County, Florida, Historical and Genealogical Library, one of the largest research centers in the southeastern United States. A past president of the Lakeland Chapter SAR, he has completed the National Institute on Genealogical Research in Washington, D.C.

As family historians, most of us struggle to "put meat on the bones" of our ancestors. Mr. Spann will be discussing **Albion's Seed**, a wonderful resource for learning about colonial ancestors and their daily lives. Published in 1989 by David Hackett Fischer, this book examines the four waves of migration from the British Isles prior to the 1770s.
