The November meeting of the *Middle Tennessee Genealogical Society* is the annual fall seminar on November 17 at the Brentwood Public Library. Doors will open at 8:15; sessions begin at 9:00 a.m. and end at 4:00 p.m. Registration, which includes lunch, is \$40 for MTGS or Tennessee Historical Society members and \$45 for others; it ends on November 9, so if you haven't sent yours in, register today. Forms are available on our website (www.mtgs.org). If space is available, walk-ins will be accepted, but the fee will be \$60 with no lunch and no handouts.

The theme for the day is "Discovering Our Ancestors Using Maps and Newspapers." Presenters are Rick and Pam Sayre, highly experienced professional genealogists who teach at the annual Institute for Genealogy and Historical Research at Samford University. The morning will be devoted to "Google Earth for Genealogists," and the afternoon sessions will be "Using Topographic & Other Maps" and "Using Newspapers and Periodicals at the Library of Congress."

Don't think that only computer techies can gain from these seminars. This extremely un-techie editor has used Google Earth to map the property of a couple of ancestors and was extremely surprised to discover how uncomplicated it is. And an ever-growing part of the Library of Congress newspaper collection is as near as your computer keyboard.

Recently it was announced that the Georgia State Archives would be closed to the public except by appointment on November 1. That has been reversed; we hope the online petitions signed by lots and lots of genealogists had something to do with the decision. The legislature voted to commit \$125,000 to keeping the archives open. Whenever any archives is threatened in such a way, it behooves all genealogists to work on its behalf. A threat to any state library or archives is really a threat to all of them because of the precedent such a closing would pose. Thanks to everyone who registered a protest about the Georgia archives!
