Parents and grandparents may be interested in a new app, announced by Dick Eastman in his newsletter. Called "Little Family Tree," it is available for both iOS and Android smartphones and tablets. According to the newsletter, it is a family tree game for children. An adult first logs into an online family tree account, like FamilySearch, and the child can play one of five games that sync with the information in the family tree.
