The Heritage at Brentwood and MTGS are sponsoring another free, all-day genealogy workshop with the incomparable J. Mark Lowe, CG, FUGA. On February 29 from 10:00am - 3:00pm, Mark will present "Resolving Difficult Genealogical Problems with New Tools."

The most difficult genealogical research problems may be solved with a solid research plan, NEW techniques, and well-proven tools to uncover additional details, persons or events that reveal more of the whole story.

The Tools in the toolbox are:

- 1) Re-Reviewing the Evidence in hand
- 2) Land Platting, Comparison, and Neighborhood
- 3) Mapping and Geography
- 4) Historical Perspective
- 5) Bringing in Court Records (Local and Appellate)
- 6) DNA testing

J. Mark Lowe is a nationally-known professional genealogist, instructor & Fellow at the Utah Genealogical Society's Salt Lake Institute of Genealogy (SLIG) & the Institute for Genealogical & Historical Resources (IGHR). He was recently awarded the Association of Professional Genealogist's *Honorary Life Membership* for his services, including past APG President & winner of the Smallwood Award.

The Heritage will provide complimentary lunch, parking and door prizes at this free event.

The event will be limited to 100 attendees, with registration offered first to <u>current MTGS</u> members (2019-2020 dues paid) and members of The Heritage's Genealogy class. The registration link for the event will be emailed to these two groups in late January. Registration for non-members will be opened up in February only if the event does not fill to capacity.
