The next MTGS regular meeting is almost here! Join us Saturday, March 17 at 1:00 pm, at the Tennessee State Library and Archives, 403 7th Avenue N., Nashville. Note that this is a **change of location** to our regular meeting location.

Our program will be presented by Dr. Mark Cheathem, Professor of History at Cumberland University. Dr. Cheathem will speak on Andrew Jackson's Kinship Networks. During his lifetime, Andrew Jackson enjoyed several types of kinship networks that benefitted him both personally and professionally. These networks included his genetic kin in South Carolina, his marital kin in Nashville, and his fictive kin in the U.S. Army. Dr. Cheathem will look at each type of network and explain how each one was crucial to making Jackson the man that we now know.

Dr. Cheathem earned his Ph.D. in history from Mississippi State University. He is the author or editor of six books, including <u>Andrew Jackson</u>, <u>Southerner</u>, which won the 2013 Tennessee History Book Award. Mark is also director of the new <u>Papers of Martin Van Buren</u> project at Cumberland University.

As always, the meeting is free and open to the public. And since the meeting is at TSLA, come early and stay late, and bring your research plan! TSLA is open from 8:00am – 4:30pm that day.

The event focuses on the stories of the enslaved African Americans who lived and worked there. Free to the public will be a guided tour of the grounds and outbuildings, the exhibit A Past Uncovered: The Story of the Enslaved People of Travellers Rest, and presentations by staff from the Metro Archives on researching African American genealogy.
